ED'S COMMENT

There are often two sides to every story, (see centre pages) but could the issues raised by 'opposite' sides of the Bildeston development debate have a meeting point? For example on one side, points are raised about the potential benefits of development by reminding us of a golden time of village life when rural communities were largely self-sufficient and well served by local commerce. But the car, supermarkets, on-line shopping, home delivery and a huge change in society and shopping habits have changed that. Perhaps new residents to our village might help stop the steady decline to which the piece refers and breathe new life into local groups and amenities. Those people who now live in what were the 'new' developments can attest to the improvements in their quality of life since moving to Bildeston. It is very difficult to win an argument shouting, "Pull up the drawbridge!" after you have just been let in!

The other side of the debate takes a similar approach by reminding us of a romantic ideal of the countryside and the need to preserve it as a legacy to be passed from one generation to another. This is a major reason why people choose to move to Suffolk and immerse themselves in village life quite different from an urban experience. The view from the top of Church Lane looking down over our village is lovely, but is a view that includes areas that once were farmland, woods, meadow and pasture but are now homes.

Keeping to facts, according to the 2013 report 'Ipswich Housing and Population and Household Projections 2011 to 2031' Suffolk's population is expected to increase significantly. Babergh's population, however, rises the least of all districts, by just 5450. Babergh District Council has identified a need for more than 1000 new houses by 2031. The Campaign to Protect Rural England (CPRE) has just published a study based on current council records which shows that there is space for more than one million homes to be built on derelict land and vacant plots, with 400,000 already with planning permission, half of which are in the East and South East of England. The CPRE clearly has its agenda but metropolitan councils acknowledge the huge number of empty houses that could be refurbished and added to the housing stock. The national campaigning charity 'Empty Homes' data for 2013, also based on council records, shows that Suffolk has 3207 empty houses, with Babergh listed as having 332. In other words if these 'brownfield' sites and empty homes were used it would go a long way to help solve the housing crisis without having to encroach on any countryside land at all. A crucial question is why are we even considering the loss of designated food production land just when the population is increasing at the fastest rate in human history?

Change is inevitable. It is right to point out that Bildeston has seen significant change over the last 15 years, both positive and negative, with new housing and people but loss of shops. It is also right to point out that turning large tracts of countryside and farmland into housing developments is not the only option to ease the housing issue. Influencing that change and its scale using accurate data and coherent arguments is the way forward. So maybe both sides really do want the same thing; a vibrant, sustainable 'village' nestling in conserved Suffolk countryside. Following the questionnaire it is up to councillors at all levels to ensure both sides can win.

COUNTRYSIDE OBSERVER

As I write it is the closing of the year and we are into December with all the festivities and family gatherings to look forward to over the Christmas holiday. We seem quite suddenly to have gone from a balmy late summer to wet days with temperatures dropping rapidly. The wood-burning stove has been fired up, leaf gathering is almost complete, the garden tidied and ready for whatever the winter throws at it and us.

Back in September I took a ride out to Orford. A road sign indicated fresh apple juice available at a farm and we followed the signs along ever narrowing lanes to finally arrive where four bottles were purchased. On the way back along an even narrower lane with steep banks to each side, I watched as a large grass snake slid down the bank and across the lane. There is something about the fact of human traces in the countryside, its paths and chance encounters. Paths are human, an exploration of our ties to the ancient pathways of Britain's landscape. They are the traces of our relationships in some ways. Walking, too, is a social activity, no matter how much we associate it with the search for isolation. There's no doubt that more people do get out, as families over the holiday, if only to walk off the Christmas meal. It is a time of year when people are far more likely to say hello. The other side of it is the knowledge that even if it's cold you are heading back to a warm house, to family, maybe a glass of "mulled wine." An identity parade has been held at Chicken HQ here at Granary House, two cockerels have been positively identified, the jury still deliberating on a third suspect. These two as I write have been dispatched and will appear on the table shortly. Sadly they had to go as the damage being caused to the established flock of hens was plain to see, not to mention the incessant crowing starting at 3.45 most mornings. noise had continued.



DEVELOPMENT DEBATE CONTINUES...

LET THEM EAT CAKE!

Some 50 to 60 villagers turned out for Keep Bildeston Beautiful's Walk&Talk on Sunday 16th November. In the Clock Tower Square, Councillor Clive Arthey's proposed new housing estates alongside Bildeston Brook, and other plans for new homes in Bildeston, were hotly debated, the conversation fuelled by coffee and cake. Jocelyn Targett addressed the crowd, saying, 'I can imagine what our roads will look like with 1-or-200 more cars driving up and down them every day - and it's not pretty.' Among Bildeston's Parish Councillors, all of whom were personally invited, only Robin Taylor, Peter Bullen and Robert Lindsay were on hand to witness the strength of feeling from villagers. Many then made their way over to The Peacock in Chelsworth for a drink and more discussion, before returning to the King's Head. Jocelyn Targett went on to say, 'Even if the roads, and the services, and the sewers can all be sorted, try telling the kingfishers who patrol the brook that 60 or 80 or 380 new homes in the fields around Bildeston are a good idea. We hear a lot about the national housing shortage. But there is no housing shortage in Suffolk villages. The notion that you solve the urban housing crisis by building vast housing estates in the countryside is laughable - it's idiotic - but its a very real threat to the calm and beauty of Bildeston, a threat to the way we choose to live, and yes a threat to the kingfishers.'

To enthusiastic applause, he finished by saying, "We owe it to ourselves, and to future generations to cherish this place, and keep it beautiful, as previous generations have for us.'

Three building companies; Blofield Watch Repairers, the Bow Window Restaurant, The King's Head Tea Rooms, Barclays Bank, a Fish & Chip Shop as well as a Post Office, a CoOp Foodstore & CoOpButcher; to add to all these lost businesses there was Last's Flowershop, Chandler's Ironmongery, Oswald's Antique Shop, Young's Grocery and, last but not least, Emmerson's the Butcher. For the village to become the vibrant, thriving place it once was we need to accept that these businesses folded for lack of trade and, unless we want to lose the few which remain, we need to act quickly. There can be no standing still watching the world go by. Many of the houses in the High Street have single occupancy which explains the low population and the dearth of shoppers. As unpalatable as it may be for many, we really do have to consider expansion and I am coming round to the view that the Ipswich Hill and Danford Park proposals are essential.

I well recall those who jumped up and down in rage when Newberry Road, Manor Road, Rotherham Road and Squirrells Mill Road developments were proposed: but can you imagine the village today without them? So it will be when the new developments are in place. These people will bring in new blood, new ideas and support for local clubs and activities and could well prove the salvation of our few remaining assets. Let us not live in the past (like Mr. Bild) but look to the future and build a better Bildeston in step with the 21st Century.

Obviously this is a subject upon which feelings run high on both sides. Maybe the Planning Committee could be instrumental in appeasing everyone by ensuring that the architect selected for these developments has a proven track record of designing properties which blend into the surrounding area picking up styles from adjacent buildings: it would also help if the developers were instructed to plant mature trees and attractive shrubs around the perimeter of their developments. This way the very attractive part of Suffolk in which we are fortunate enough to live will be protected whilst the young should be able to find homes in the area in which they grew up.

WASTE – OH NO IT'S NOT!

At Orchard Barn we try to re-use everything – nothing is thrown away.

A great example of this is our composting. We have numerous deadwood screen 'bins' like the ones in the photo and while one is being filled there is always another to be emptied and its contents put to good use.

Amazingly, up to 30% of household rubbish in Suffolk could be composted, rather than going to landfill, where it can't break down and produces toxic gases. Home or community composting saves you money and brings environmental benefits.


We've found the best compost comes from a mixture of approx. 50% "green" and 50% "brown" organic material. "Greens" break down quickly and, in household waste, are fruit and vegetable peelings, tea bags, coffee grounds, crushed eggshells, weeds. "Browns" add air pockets and make a healthy mix, and are chopped up woody stems, cardboard and paper eg toilet roll tubes, junk mail scrunched, shredded paper, egg boxes. So, for every bucket full of garden waste, we add the same amount of woody material.

At the Barn we use also an activator – urine in sawdust, but that may not be to everyone's liking, however, it does help the heap to heat up! Turning the compost to introduce air also speeds up the process and keeps us warm during winter months.

Recipe of the Month Leek, Chicken and Wild Mushroom Risotto

- 1lb finely sliced leek
- 12oz sliced raw chicken breast
- 6oz mushrooms
- 1 cup per person pre-cooked long grain rice
- 2 cloves garlic crushed
- 1 large glass dry white wine

- 1 chicken stock cube
- · Half pint double cream
- Chopped parsley and chives
- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- salt and pepper

Method

- 1. Heat 2 tablespoons of olive oil in a large thick bottomed pan
- 2. Add the chicken pieces and fry gently until golden brown
- 3. Remove from the pan with a slotted spoon and keep to one side
- 4. Add the remainder of the oil to the pan together with the leeks, sliced mushrooms and crushed garlic
- 5. Cook gently until soft

- 6. Add the cooked chicken, wine and stock cube, simmer and season to taste
- 7. Add the cooked rice, stirring constantly
- 8. Add the herbs and cream and bring back to simmer until a sloppy consistency is achieved
- 9. Serve with a fresh mixed salad and dressing





CLERK'S COLUMN STREET LIGHTING IS CHANGING

Suffolk County Council has been implementing 'part-night' lighting and streetlight dimming across the whole of Suffolk, with the objective of reducing energy consumption, saving both money and reducing CO2 emissions. The County Council estimates that introducing the system will save at least £550,000 per year in energy costs and has the potential to deliver a significant reduction in carbon dioxide.

Therefore, for some time now street lights have been switched off in Bildeston between midnight and 5.30am every night. Following discussions between the County Council and the Parish Council this arrangement will now also be applied in Bildeston to street lights owned by the Parish Council. This aligns us with other communities across Suffolk whilst creating some savings for the Parish Council.

The new arrangements are due to come into effect from 1st February, 2015.
