ED'S COMMENT

Happy New Year to you all. Firstly, the Bugle sends its sincere thanks to all our advertisers and helpers over the past year. Without you the Bugle could not function as a free resource for the village.

Welcome to the year 2020! That number sounds so familiar, maybe it's because it has been used by opticians for so many years! 20/20 vision is the phrase used to describe normal visual acuity, which just means the clarity or sharpness of your eye sight. It's measured at a distance of 20 feet, so if you have 20/20 vision, it means you can see clearly at 20 feet things that should normally be seen at that distance. It's a phrase that is well known to mean perfect eye sight, and you can bet this coming year will be full of jokes about 20/20 vision! What might be less well known is that 20/20 is only used in the United States, because since the UK lost some of its imperial measures, the UK changed the numbers from feet to metres. 20 feet is 6 metres, so 20/20 is equal to 6/6. I don't know about you, but that doesn't trip off the tongue in quite the same way. "I have perfect sight, yep, I'm 6/6!" Sounds more like boasting about your height, which in my case, for those of you who know me well, is well wide of the mark. Even though the UK started the metric process legally in 1965 it's only since 1st January 2000, that the mile, yard, foot and inch was given legal permission to continue for road traffic signs, distance and speed measurement; but not for eye tests! But 20/20 vision remains as a phrase. It's also there in the quote: 'Hindsight is 20/20'. Meaning that it's easy to be wise after the event, easy to know the right thing to do after something has happened, but much harder to predict the future. So, as we enter the year 2020, how sharp is our vision? How clear are we about what lies ahead? And, given what we now know about the events last month and the result of the election, how good was our 'hindsight 20/20'? How many people have said to you, "Told you so!" Or, "Knew that would happen!"

Talking about perfect 20/20 vision, you cannot have failed to notice the new pub sign proudly hanging above The King's Head in the High Street and also on the King's Head advert on page 15. It isn't just any king; it's King Edward the Elder, king of the Anglo-Saxons during the first century, so called because he was the first son of King Alfred the Great who spent his life trying to establish a united England from the great kingdoms of Mercia, York, Northumbria, Wessex and East Anglia. Edward himself was King of the Anglo-Saxons from 899 to his death in 924 and laid the foundations for his son, Athelstan, by putting an end to Viking attacks from Northumbria and conquering the last parts of Viking-ruled southern England in the 910's, finally ending Viking rule in Wessex, Mercia and East Anglia. Nigel, landlord of the King's Head, being a history buff and quizmaster, was offered a new sign by a local artist in recognition of his good works. Nigel decided to have a sign that not only went with the pub's name, but had relevance to our place in East Anglia. Edward's son, Athelstan, became the first true King of England when he united the kingdoms of Mercia, Wessex and East Anglia into one kingdom and defeated the Vikings taking over the kingdom of York as well. it was the Angles, who settled in this region, leading to it being known as Angleland and then England. So, Nigel says, the sign has significance and hopes you all lke it! How 20/20 were the election polls? They predicted a Conservative lead of around 10 points, but all had a health warning of a margin of error. This meant they saw outcomes ranging from a hung parliament to a more modest Conservative win. None saw a win as big as Margaret Thatcher's in the 1980s! COUNTRYSIDE OBSERUER

For a number of years I have had my suspicions about a mystical river dweller that was possibly back in the river Brett. The animal is the Otter and we now have reliable confirmation of Otter sightings close to the village. Otters re-colonised the British Isles after the last Ice Age, and were widespread across the whole landmass during much of the intervening 10,000 years. From the mid-1950s to late 1970s there was a dramatic decline. This mirrored what was happening across much of Europe. By the late 1970s the only healthy populations were in parts of Scotland, although small populations remained in Wales and

northern and south-western England. The decline was closely linked to the introduction of organochlorine pesticides that were used in agricultural seed dressings, and sheep dips. When first used these chemicals were applied in very high doses and caused largescale mortalities among many animals. Their impact was greatest among top predators, birds of prey and mammals, because of the way these chemicals build up in the food chain. After these chemicals were withdrawn, bird populations recovered quickly. Otters that had survived in areas with low-intensity agriculture also responded, though more slowly because of their relatively low breeding rate and inability to cover large distances. The first national otter survey in 1977-79 found evidence of otters at only 6% of sites examined. Since then, the surviving otter population has expanded from Wales, southwest and northern England; Wales and Scotland are now extensively occupied and England's population is still expanding. Direct counting of otters is impossible due to their mobility, secretive behaviour and largely nocturnal habit. Otter surveys are based on field signs such as spraints (faeces) and footprints. While the distribution and frequency of field signs is used as an indicator of the health of the population locally, any estimate of numbers would be highly speculative. It is likely that there are several thousand otters present in England today. In the early 1980s, the Nature Conservancy Council (now Natural England) worked with the Otter Trust to develop a reintroduction programme to repopulate parts of Eastern England with captive-bred otters. The Otter Trust released 117 captive-bred otters between 1983 and 1999, mostly on East Anglian rivers. The Vincent Wildlife Trust released a further 49 between 1990 and 1996. Now descendants of the released otters form a tiny proportion of the otter population of England, and most wild otters are the result of the natural recovery of the species. Otters breed at any time of year. Females normally breed in their second or third year and select an undisturbed holt close to an abundant food source, giving birth to two or three cubs. The cubs remain in the holt for about three months and stay with the mother for up to a year. Male otters occupy separate holts and play little or no part in the rearing of the young. Otters live for three to four years in the wild. The most common natural causes of death are starvation or injuries sustained from territorial fighting. Non-natural mortalities are road kills and drowning in fish and crustacean traps. In fresh waters, otters are mainly active from dusk to dawn. Activity of coastal otters is linked to the state of the tide, and they can often be seen during the day. Even on rivers activity in daylight is becoming more common. This reflects not only their increasing distribution but may also show that, with the lack of persecution, otters are becoming less wary of people. Habituation to people may result in some individuals being more approachable, but these are not tame. Mike Biddulph





This month I met up with Mel Gemmell, whose hobby is making Mohair bears.

Mel grew up in Nedging, attended Bildeston primary school and moved on to Hadleigh High school. One of Mel's first jobs was working with horses earning £25 a week on a youth training scheme (YTS). Then Mel worked for Skar plastics in Hadleigh before moving to Arberfield in 1998 with her husband who was stationed there with his job in the army.

Mel moved back to Suffolk, and moved to Bildeston in 2012. I asked Mel how did her hobby begin, Mel said she had given up smoking and needed a hobby to take her mind off things, so she started making little tiny mohair bears.

Each bear takes around three days to make. Mel uses different colour mohair, with Cotterpin joints and glass eyes, these bears are weighted down with steel shot in their stomach to make them more solid and able to sit upright. Mel sells her smaller bears for £25 each and you can request a certain colour and design of bear. Each bear comes in its own craft bag and has its own little gift tag and are very unique.

Mel buys her materials on line and at local craft shops. At the moment Mel is making a large fluffy bear, and is busy designing more bear designs. Mel has a face book and instagram page if anyone would like to take look at what she does, it is called "Mels-teds" Mel says she finds her hobby very relaxing.

Happy New Year Bildeston. I do hope you have had a wonderful Christmas and are looking forward to a happy and healthy new year.

There have been periods in our recent history when that wish would have been difficult to imagine. Our next book is set after one of those horrific times. It is 1922. The World is very different, not only from today, but for many from the lives they led before WW1. Returning ex-servicemen are disenchanted. Many are out of work and felt let down by the government of the day. After the restoration of Pre-war practices, women found themselves pushed back into the home and caring roles.

Homes and lives have been shattered by the deaths of thousands of men. Husbands, brothers, sons! In one such home we discover Mrs Wray and her spinster daughter, Frances who find themselves obliged to take in lodgers, Lilian and Leonard Barber, to make ends meet

Frances and her mother would have been described as 'genteel', not so the Barbers and as Frances tries to take care of the domestic duties, as they can no longer afford staff, she begins an affair with her tenant. It is not her first illicit love affair and as a woman of the 1920's she is frustrated by the expectations and constraints put upon her.

The following events change all their lives for ever and lead to a murder, an intriguing court case and revelations and self-discovery. The book explores many issues such as class, gender and social mobility as well as forbidden love.

Did we enjoy the book? Well, we all felt rather disappointed with the choice. It begins well with good descriptions, but we sadly didn't like any of the characters. Connecting with the protagonists proved very difficult.

It did however lead to some very interesting discussions about how women's roles have changed and what a more open World we, at least in the West, now live in. The story is one of it's setting, although written today, it holds true to the restraints and limitations of the time.

As we begin 2020, like the characters in 'The Paying Guests' by Sarah Waters, we will look back at what was and move towards what will be. I hope you enjoy whatever you read and discover new friends and worlds between the pages.

And remember, "Life is like a book. Some chapters are sad, some happy, and some exciting. But if you never turn the page, you will never know what the next chapter holds." — Unknown Author

Recipe of the Month

LEMON AND BASIL ROASTED COD WITH GREEN PEA MASH

with thanks to Alison

Ingredients

serves 2 people
250-300g Cod Loin
1tsp olive oil
2 tbsp torn fresh basil
1 garlic clove peeled and crushed
Finely grated zest of ½ lemon plus 1 tbsp
freshly squeezed lemon juice
Freshly ground black pepper
150g cherry tomatoes
200g peeled potatoes
250g frozen peas
50g low fat soft cheese
1 tbsp low fat mayonnaise



Method

1. Preheat oven to 200C/180C fan Gas mark 6.

To garnish optional fresh basil leaves

- 2. Place the two pieces of fish into a non stick roasting tray. Mix together the olive oil, torn basil, garlic, lemon zest and juice and season with the black pepper.
- 3. Spread equal amounts onto each piece of fish and roast for 12-15 minutes until fish is cooked through. ** After 5 minutes of cooking, arrange the cherry tomatoes around the fish.
- 4. While the fish is cooking, dice the potatoes and add to a pan of boiling water. Cook for 5 minutes then add the peas and cook for a further 3 minutes. Drain then add the soft cheese and mayonnaise and blend to a mash consistency. Warm this mix through in the microwave for a minute.
- 5. Divide between two serving plates and top with the cod and roasted tomatoes.
- 6. Garnish with the basil leaves and an extra grinding of black pepper.

C100/19/20 CLERK'S REPORT

Assurances had been received from the architect about the extent of the works that were being undertaken. It had been confirmed that the architect had been put on notice that if, during a site meeting the following week by the Heritage and Conservation Officer, it became apparent that something had been removed that was of significance, then this would be regarded as a criminal offence.

It was AGREED: That the Clerk be requested to liaise further with Babergh District Council stressing the concerns of the local community about the extent of works being undertaken at Dukes Hall

It is noted that it is also close to a heritage asset in the form of the Grade 1 listed Parish Church and detracts from this when viewed from some angles. The Parish Council has been sympathetic to previous proposals that have been submitted in respect of this site which it considers have been reasonable. However, the degree of separation of the structure from the main property and its impact upon the landscape mean that the Parish Council is unable to support the present proposal. The Parish Council has received representations from local people expressing concern about the application with references being made to the adjacent meadow and overlooking from the Pergola towards a window of an adjacent barn such that it might be considered intrusive in terms of the residential amenity of at least one neighbour.

C105/19/20 M A T T E R S BROUGHT TO THE ATTENTION OF THE COUNCIL

Further to Minute C96/19/20, the Clerk had written to the relevant party over the unauthorised erection of a headstone at the Grove Cemetery.

The Clerk reported that he had liaised with Suffolk County Council and requested that the streetlights owned by Bildeston Parish Council would be left on until 2am each morning over the period from 21st December 2019 to 2nd January 2019 inclusive. This arrangement would not apply to those streetlights owned by Suffolk County Council which followed the periods of lighting agreed for the whole of the County.

The Clerk had liaised with the Maintenance Operative and it had been confirmed that the grit bins in the village had been replenished by Suffolk County Council.

Councillor Hubbard questioned the insurance position regarding the Clock Tower. Traditionally, the owner of Bank House Stores had opened and closed the tower at the beginning and end of their opening hours. This was done during the summer months but was not done throughout the year. It was noted that the tower was used for storage and as a bus shelter. The Clerk was asked to write to the owner of the stores asking the proprietor if he would be prepared to uphold this traditional

arrangement of opening and closing the Clock Tower throughout the year.

Councillor Hubbard had circulated some information about the design of a new Village sign. The Clerk was asked to ensure that it was included on the agenda for the next Parish Council meeting.

There was a discussion about the frustrations that existed with regard to the Parish Council's email system and Councillor Lester indicated that he would arrange for it to be upgraded, which could be done at minimal cost.

Councillors referred to the accumulation of leaves in various parts of the village and the Clerk was asked to report this to Babergh District Council with a view to seeking the deployment of a roadsweeper.

The meeting closed at 9.22pm.
